OPERATIONS

The 96 Pursuit Squadron (Interceptor) was activated on 9 February 1942 at Harding Field, Louisiana flying the P-38 "Lightning." The unit moved to Muroc, California then Glendale, California to begin training for World War II and was redesignated the 96 Fighter Squadron (Twin Engine) on 15 May 1942. The unit deployed to Northern Ireland on 5 October 1942 and started flying combat missions in the European Theater of Operations.

In December 1942, the 96 moved to North Africa flying combat missions throughout Algeria and Tunisia in the Mediterranean Theater of Operations. The unit then relocated back to the European continent flying fighter missions throughout Italy, France, Rumania and Germany. After the war was won, the squadron was deactivated in September 1945.

In August 1947, the squadron was redesignated the 96 Fighter Squadron, Single Engine, flying the P-51 "Mustang" from Grenier Field, New Hampshire. The unit deployed to Ladd AFB, Alaska and was deactivated in October 1949.

On 11 September 1952, the unit was reactivated as the 96 Fighter-Interceptor Squadron flying the F-94 out of New Castle Airport, Delaware.

The 96 Fighter Interceptor Squadron was the largest user of the F-94 as an operational squadron, as they had the dual role of being the F-94 Operational Training Unit, OTU, having had a total of fifty examples assigned to them at one time or another. In this capacity, in addition to air defense duties, they instructed the new Moody AFB graduates in the finer points of being an interceptor crew. The difference between how to do it the Air Training Command way, and how to do it in reality, and stay alive in the process.

On 22 June 1972, the unit was redesignated the 96 Flying Training Squadron (FTS) at Williams AFB, Arizona flying the T-37 aircraft. The 96 FTS trained USAF and foreign student pilots in all phases of primary Undergraduate Pilot Training. The 96 FTS was the first flying squadron to train women Air Force pilots in 1977. The 96 FTS was deactivated on 26 June 1992.

On 1 April 1998, the squadron was reactivated as the 96 Flying Training Squadron, Laughlin AFB, Texas as a Reserve Associate Squadron, Air Force Reserve Command. The 96 FTS was the first squadron in the Air Force with Instructor Pilots teaching SUPT student pilots in all three trainer aircraft - the T-37, T-38 and T-1. In December of 2004, the 47th Flying Training Wing completed the transition from T-37 aircraft to the T-6 Texan II.
